- In the gospels, the "apostle to the apostles"
- Because she went to the tomb to anoint Jesus, later Christians confuse her with
 - a sinful woman who anoints Jesus' feet (Luke 7:36-50)
 - another Mary who anoints Jesus' feet (John 12:1-8)
 - the adulteress whom Jesus saves from stoning (late addition to John, now in 7:53-8:11)

HOW DO THESE CHARACTERS FUNCTION?		
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How Do These Holy Harlots & Transvestite Saints Function?		
 Post persecution, these stories 		
 Entertain: vivid language, exotic locales; beasts of desert replace beasts in arenas 		
 <u>Discipline</u>: newly converted women (and men) are disciplined into asceticism against these exaggerated models 		
 Reassure: that conversion is possible even for sinners 		
 <u>Redirect</u> desire from temporal and ephemeral goals to God 		
 <u>Teach</u>: the cross means death to this world and a different kind of life 		
For monks in monasteries		
 Fantasies of male monks defeat their own desires by projecting them onto imagined women in their midst 		
 Stories of females charged with paternity explore the mystery of God's fatherhood
